Chair's Report

In many ways Eco Whittlesford had its beginning with a Seeds and Bees project at school in September 2021. The pandemic delayed things, but three of us (Fanny Moreau, Sally Thomas and Sue Ginsberg) who had met at the Pop Up Café at school eventually gave a packet of native wildflower seeds to every pupil and members of staff in a special assembly, for sowing in their gardens or other space! Later that autumn we had an EcoFest at church.

Sowing seeds is a good place to begin, and it has felt like this as Eco Whittlesford has started to germinate and send up shoots over the last year.

Bit by bit, and lots of interesting, timely conversations and meetings later, we formed the Hub Group. About a year ago we agreed on a constitution (see our website) and had a launch stand at the 1000 years village celebration.

As we carried on considering energy, in March this year National Hydrogen Champion Jane Toogood and her colleague at Johnson Matthey Caroline Roberts, shared their knowledge about the advances that are being made already in the use of Hydrogen as energy. Treasurer's report

The Group and its Objectives

- Eco Whittlesford was established by a group of volunteers in 2022. A constitution for the group was adopted that year. The constitution sets the aims of the group as being to make the village of Whittlesford "more environmentally friendly and greener for us all today and for future generations to come" and "to encourage one another to work together" to:
 - reduce our carbon footprints
 - conserve wildlife and encourage biodiversity;
 - preserve the rural character of the village;
 - build these aims into our everyday lives."
- The group fulfils these objectives by organising public talks, open free of charge to all residents of the village, undertaking projects to reduce the carbon footprint of the village, promoting awareness of the natural environment and undertaking projects that enhance, protect and restore the natural environment.
- The group opened its first bank account in January 2023.
- The group has benefited from a financial donation of £1,000 from the Whittlesford May Ball Committee, which has been paid into the group bank account.
- To date, items of expenditure incurred by the group include a payment for public liability insurance to cover group activities and a payment for advertising events in the village magazine. It is expected that other expenses connected with group activities will be incurred during the year.
- The Group holds a community chest grant of £1,500 from South Cambridgeshire
 District Council to fund a designated project. Grant funds cannot be spent on any other
 projects and any underspend must be returned to the District Council.
